Woodard came into being in 1965, when rapidly increasing numbers meant the school urgently needed another house. It was named after the Reverend William Woodard who had been Headmaster of the College in 1866, and advocated the teaching of 'the unfashionable cause of science'.

In 1977 Woodard House was moved to the old rambling Convent site where other boarding houses were also located. In 2002 the new house was built on the main school site, an impressive building rendered in an earthy pink to reflect the hues of the local soil, with lovely views over the 1st XI cricket outfield.

It is the intention of the Houseparent and House staff to make Woodard a friendly, happy and exciting house in which to live and learn. The Houseparent's aim is to bring out the best in the pupils, whatever their interests. Above all, Woodard should be a safe and happy home away from home, allowing the pupils to meet their potential in work and play.

If Mr Lambert is not around, pupils can talk to the Deputy Houseparent Mr Woodman who also lives in the House on the ground floor. In addition, there are the Woodard House Assistants who do an evening duty from 7pm to 10.30pm. Pupils can always ask them for help and advice when they are on duty or at any other convenient time.

There are specific Third Form tutors who have extensive experience in helping the transition from prep school to King's College. They understand the common concerns that your child will have and can pre-empt these issues, thereby settling the pupils into the Woodard family. They also prepare your child for the tough decisions that have to be made for their GCSE choices.

Fourth and Fifth Form tutors are specialists in preparing your child for the pressure of GCSE exams, through to A level choices. They know what makes them 'tick' and are well placed to advise them on the best course of action. They are well versed in helping to find a balance between academic studies and sporting and co-curricular interests.

In all cases, the Tutor is the first point of contact if you have a query regarding your child.


I have been a King's pup since the start of the Third Form and a boarder since the age of seven;

The School Calendar

The daily timetable, events, activities and sports fixtures that will take place throughout that term can be accessed on the school portal.

Registration and Roll Calls

It is very important that you register between 8.10am and 8.20am (Monday to Saturday) in the House common room. Day pupils who arrive late must register at reception in the main it will be returned 24 hours later school building. There is also a registration in the afternoon at 1.45pm in the Woodard common room, and at 7pm on a Saturday night.

Monday to Friday there is a roll call in House for boarders and day pupils staying for prep at 6.50pm, but it is expected that pupils are in their study areas starting prep by this time.

There is a formal roll call at 10.30am and 2pm on Sunday and then at 6.50pm in the large House common room.

Internet and Electronic Devices

The House has internet access that each pupil can use through their school login. The main use of the internet should be for work purposes and contacting family. However, a measured and appropriate use for social media and gaming is acceptable following the school's IT usage policy, and with guidance on balancing phone use through PSHE and house discussions.

Internet should not be used through mobile phone networks as the school has no ability to ensure appropriate guidance and e-safety.

Pupils may use their laptops during prep times, however, mobile phones will taken in during prep (7pm - 8.30pm). All electronic devices will be taken in at bedtime. If a phone is confiscated for inappropriate use, for example during lessons,

Reports

Each term pupils receive numerous reports. Every three to four weeks you will get an effort report simply stating a numerical value associated with the level of effort exerted in each subject

At the end of half terms and full terms more detailed written reports will be completed to show achievement grades, effort grades and in examination years, target grades. These will be complemented by teacher, tutor and Houseparent comments.

The School Week

A Typical Day

Breakfast is between 7.30am and 8am. There is a registration in House between 8.10am and 8.20am every morning, and day pupils should arrive for this time. Between 8.30am and 8.50am there will be a House meeting (Monday), an assembly (Tuesday), a tutor period (Thursday) Wednesday of that week. If they are to stay with or a short Chapel Service (Friday). There are three or four lessons in the morning followed by lessons and games in the afternoon. Supper is at 6pm and prep starts at 7pm. Day pupils can go home after their last school commitment or can choose to stay in the House for prep. There is free time after prep when pupils to 8.30pm for the whole school. Third Form pupils should be in the dormitory at 9.40pm with lights out at 9.50pm.

Weekend Arrangements

Saturday morning is the same as a normal school day up to lunch, with sporting commitments in the afternoon. This is when most, but by no King's, or as an away fixture. Parents, guardians, family and friends are invited to watch either home or away fixtures when possible. Day pupils are free to go home once they have finished their school commitments, and can be picked up at an away fixture if suitable.

Boarders are encouraged/expected to stay at school over weekends since there are loads of activities and social events on offer. However, if they would like to go away for the weekend, parents or guardians must complete the weekly form sent out by Mr Lambert by midnight on the friend's parents.

It's recommended all boarders stay the first weekend for the House to bond and settle.

Prep Time

Evening study sessions (prep) run from 7pm period. The Fifth and Sixth Formers are expected to study outside this time as well. Pupils are expected to be in their study areas ready to start work at 7pm. It is imperative that this time is quiet and conducive to academic study.

Signing In and Out

Everybody in the House must sign out in the means all, sports fixtures against other teams and evening or when leaving the school on a trip schools are scheduled. These can be at home at or during Town Time. This is so that we know whether they are in the building or not. They must also remember to sign in on return.

Sport

Pupils should play sport and/or take part in activities at least three times a week, whatever their standard. Lists for games appear on the notice boards in the main school corridor.

If a pupil's name does not appear on the activities list on the first day or two, please let us know immediately.

Day pupils use their room in Woodard to change, and can store kit there if desired, though they must remember to keep it tidy!



HOUSE TRADITIONS

Prefects - Upper Sixth pupils have the opportunity to be a House prefect. This enables them to develop their leadership skills and give back to the House by helping and supporting others. For example they may help with prep, help duty staff get younger years to bed, lead on inter-House competitions and generally be good role models.

House Colours - House Colours are awarded to pupils who go above and beyond for the House. This might mean contributing to a single House event or competition, or consistently putting themselves forwards for the House. They can also be awarded for positive contributions to the House community and Colours are awarded at Junior (Third to Fifth Form) and Senior (Sixth Form) level.

Domestic Arrangements

Day Pupils

Day pupils are encouraged to play as full a part in the House as possible. You may go home after your school commitments but many pupils stay for all or part of prep time in the evening. You may also wish to stay for school activities such as play rehearsals.

Pupils are encouraged to board on one night of the week (free of charge). Parents and guardians will be sent an electronic form by Mr Lambert on Fridays that is to be completed by midnight on Sunday to request boarding nights for the following week. Any changes to this must be emailed to Mr Lambert.

When a day pupil arrives in the morning (8.20am when they go home for the day they are expected within the bounds of reasonable taste. to sign out. When they sign out it is assumed that they are going straight home.

Valuables

As a house we have a very strict anti-theft culture, which everyone supports. However, all pupils have lockable spaces and are encouraged to use them for anything of great value, and ensure that they have appropriate insurance for loss or damage. Where possible, please name all valuables.

We also have a strong policy of not borrowing without permission, something that can lead to stressful misunderstandings if not adhered to.

Bedrooms

Our Third Formers are located on the second floor, the Fourth Form on the first floor in dorms. Fifth Formers generally share twin rooms and we are fortunate all Sixth Form boarders have individual rooms throughout the House. Each floor has a kitchen, so please feel free to bring food. All pupils must bring a padlock to lock all valuables away safely.

Tuck Shop and Food

There is a House tuck shop running daily at break and from 8.30 to 9pm. Milk can be ordered at the beginning of term for pupil's own use and charged to their school bill.

You should always sign out. The Sixth Form have the same rules at the weekend but during the week can go out after 2pm and return by 6.30pm. You must honour all school commitments before going into town.

Laundry

emptied each morning and clean clothes should reappear in individual lockers in the linen room within a day or so. Games kit should be ready within 24 hours of placing it into the baskets. As well as the school laundry service, we have in-House facilities that include washing machine, tumble dryers and ironing equipment.

Start and End of Term

Boarders are expected to return to school between 5pm and 7pm at the start of every term and half term. Boarding Houses close at 5pm at the end of every term and half term. The only anomalies to these timings are for the very first Sunday of the academic year, where we welcome pupils throughout the day, and the final day of the **Travel** year where we finish at lunchtime with Houses closing at 2pm.

The official school ending times are available on the school website and are also published in the department using travel@kings-taunton.co.uk school diary. The Houses need to be vacated promptly at the end of terms and beginning of half terms. The boarding Houses are not staffed after this time so it is not possible for any pupils to be accommodated after this time and date. Nor is it possible for any pupils to access the boarding Houses during the school holidays. It is important therefore that flights are arranged transfers

to correspond with term dates. If it is not possible There are linen baskets on each floor. These are to secure a flight on this day then pupils will need to stay with their guardians until the day of their flights.

> The only exception to this is when a school trip has been organised. On such occasions the member of staff organising the trip will put in place suitable accommodation arrangements.

Due to the requirements of the UK Home Office, all boarders with a tier 4 visa are required to provide precise details of movements during holidays, including flight details and the addresses between school and home. The Houseparent at which they will be staying.

All international boarders must provide full travel details to travel@kings-taunton.co.uk, these will then be collated and shared with the Houseparent. Domestic boarders must contact the Houseparent if anyone other than parents of designated carers are dropping their child off.

Older boarders and cars – Due to the limited amount of parking space, boarders are not generally allowed to keep their cars at school. Exceptional reguests can be made to the Deputy Head Pastoral. If permission is granted to keep a car at school, it may only be used for commuting will keep the car keys at all other times. Only the designated driver may use the car and they may not give lifts to anyone else.

Welfare and Pupil Safety

Pastoral Care

We believe that all pupils, both boarding and day, are of equal worth, and that they are entitled to be treated with equal respect, courtesy and consideration at all times, regardless of their sex, race, religion, abilities or social background. King's College aims to provide education in a disciplined and caring environment.

Respect and consideration for others. independence of thought and self-motivation are of prime importance, and pupils are encouraged to participate fully in the activities of the school.

All members of the school have a duty to:

- · Recognise, appreciate and acknowledge the contribution made by pupils of different genders and nationalities to the richness of the school's academic, social, cultural and sporting life.
- Treat each other fairly and with sensitivity. recognising that a person's gender, race, religion, abilities or social circumstances are not subjects for negative comment or behaviour of any kind.

All staff, pupils and parents are expected to support the ethos of the school and to promote a civilised, friendly, compassionate and secure environment. The school recognises the importance of the triangular relationship between pupils, parents and staff, and communication

is encouraged at all times. Houseparents and House staff are especially important in this

Each pupil is under the care of a Houseparent. Tutors also provide valuable support. Parents and pupils are encouraged to refer problems or difficulties to the Houseparent at all times but all members of staff accept a pastoral role in order to promote the welfare of pupils.

The Chaplain, Deputy Heads, Health Centre staff and Headmaster are also always available; their telephone numbers are published in the diary. Senior pupils are also appointed Prefects, and their most important function is to look after the pupils in their care.

Conduct and Discipline

The school rules are published in the School Diary, but the essential principles are as follows:

- Pupils must at all times use their common sense. Any breach of common sense will be treated as a breach of the school rules.
- Pupils must obey the laws of the land. Every pupil must show respect for others at all times, and bullying should always be reported to an adult.

The school seeks to reward pupils and must also occasionally apply sanctions and reprimands. temporary removal of privileges, detention, restrictions during leisure time and manual work in the school grounds.

severe or unjustified, then they may appeal to their Houseparent, any member of staff or the Headmaster, or contact their parents. For more serious offences, such as bullying or involvement in drugs or stealing, and for persistent breaches of any school rule, the school reserves the right to exclude pupils from school on a temporary or permanent basis. It also reserves the right to conduct drug tests where there is reasonable cause for concern.

Health Centre

All boarders are registered with Warwick House Medical Practice, a local practice in Taunton. The King's College Health Centre is well supported by the school doctors and there is a doctor's surgery every weekday, though pupils needing medical attention outside school surgery times will be taken to Warwick House Medical Practice. the Out of Hours Doctor or to Accident and Emergency, whichever is appropriate.

No pupil may have in their possession any medicines or drugs without authorisation from Such punishments will include verbal reprimands, the Health Centre staff and the knowledge of the Houseparent concerned, though confidentiality is alwavs maintained.

> Physiotherapy is available within the Health Centre on Monday and Thursday afternoons. There is also a fully qualified Counsellor available for appointments on a Monday and Wednesday afternoon.

Fire Regulations and Practice

Fire extinguishers and blankets are checked monthly and serviced once a year by Tone Fire. Fire safety checks are carried out periodically and fire drills are held at least once a term. All boarders are briefed on fire evacuation procedures during their first day at King's College, and then at regular intervals throughout the year.
